President's Remarks

Podcasts, Youtube, blogs – what do these have to do with LWVAA? More than you might realize!

On Monday, May 5 at 6:00 pm, Dr. Stephen Brooks's class on New Media will present their projects for LWVAA. The presentations will be in room 207 of Leigh Hall on the University of Akron campus. As I mentioned in the February Voter, the students have taken on LWVAA as their class project, and have been hard at work exploring ways that new media can work for LWVAA, to help us to reach a segment of our community for whom "old media" – newspapers and hard copy materials – have little appeal. We won't be abandoning traditional media outlets, but learning to add new media to our repertoire is an exciting and necessary step to broaden the League's appeal and thereby engage younger citizens in the political process.

Everyone in LWVAA is invited to attend the program. I think you'll be amazed and intrigued by the students' ideas, as well as the possibilities for us as a League to be on the "cutting edge" of new technology.

It's important that as many members as possible be on hand for the presentations. Not only do we want to show the students we appreciate their hard work and forward-looking ideas, but we also need as many Leaguers as possible to understand the concepts that we may be putting to work for League in the very near future. Please call or email me if you plan to attend so that I can let Dr. Brooks know how many of us to expect.

On a related note, the Board of LWVAA has approved a proposed dues increase to be submitted to the membership for approval at the annual meeting, from \$50 to \$60, with students and additional members of the same household paying \$30. This increase is reflected in the proposed budget, which you will find elsewhere in this issue. There are several reasons for this proposed increase: PMP, or our Per Member Payment to State and National will be increasing to a total of \$51.50, leaving a shortfall of \$1.50 per member at the current rate; we anticipate some initial expenses related to adopting some of the suggestions for use of new media; and we must raise our profile in the community in order to attract new members to carry out the work of the League.

This increase is in line with other Leagues in Ohio, who are facing many of the same issues we are. And while it may seem like a lot, it really only amounts to \$0.84 per month above our previous dues. I think supporting the important work of LWVAA is well worth an extra \$0.84 per month, don't you?



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Election Reform Townhall Report

Thanks to the many LWVAA members, Hudson LWV, (Rosanne Thomas and Barbara Bos, who televised our meeting!), and the support of our 13 sponsors, the LWVAA Town Hall Meeting on Election Reform was a stellar success. With the \$750.00 allotted from the Joyce Foundation to LWVO for each of the statewide town hall meetings, LWVAA could afford the Sheraton Ballroom with the assistance of our Women Studies sponsor at the University of Akron. The spacious room, the food service, the electronic gear (in place and tested) created a cheery atmosphere for the tables to begin discussing the electron process in Ohio. The facilitators and recorders, representatives from the sponsoring groups (including 12 from the Bliss Institute), guided each of the 12 tables to compose a question expressing their greatest concern about voting in Ohio. These questions pertained to electronic voting and its tabulation, provisional ballots and how they are counted, and problems encountered at the polls on voting day.

Peg Rosenfield and Ann Henkener, LWVO Election Law Specialists, touched many of these topics in their pro/con presentation. They discussed ways to provide oversight on the Boards of Election to remove the appearance of partisanship, how to reduce the excessive use of provisional ballots in Ohio, improving poll worker training and attracting younger poll workers as well as extending the time for voting and location of sites.

Following the question/answer period of the meeting, each table was asked to prepare an action statement — something they could do to correct or improve an election flaw. Many tables focused on involving students as poll workers urging the Board of Election, The Board of Education, the University of Akron, and the PTA to develop programs for such service to be included in school activities and schedules.

To close the meeting Anne Nelson, Director of LWVO imPACT Town Hall Meetings, encouraged the audience to take action by demonstrating how easy it is to reach their legislators by using the imPACT website. Once on the website http://www.ohioimpact.org click on "Speak Up" to get the contact information for your legislators. She also complimented our Town Hall Meeting and said it is one of the best she has attended. And as an additional accolade to our meeting, four people decided to join the League and help us with our efforts to encourage citizens to vote.

Special Report: Bliss Institute Election Year Speaker Randy Brinson

On April 10, the Bliss Institute presented Randy Brinson, a National Voter Registration Expert and Director of "Redeem the Vote", in their series of Election Year Speakers. Supported by Christian churches, his group has a large commercial bus decorated with their name. They attend rock concerts or other entertainment sites where young people gather and give them the opportunity to register to vote. His group was particularly successful in Iowa before the caucuses. As an aid to these young voters, his group would later call them to see which candidate they favored in either party. When the candidate was named, they would turn on a tape that explained the candidate's stance on such issues as gay rights and abortion. Hucka bee did very well in Iowa. Mr. Brinson noted that Giuliani did not.
