## League, Groups Issue Report on Obama Administration's Ethics, Lobbying & Transparency Reforms (from LWVUS)

The League of Women Voters and other groups issued a report [January 11, 2010] grading the Obama Administration's first year of achievements in ethics, lobbying and government transparency.

"The Obama Administration took extraordinary steps forward in 2009—adopting the strongest and most comprehensive lobbying, ethics and transparency rules and policies ever established to govern its own activities" said Mary G. Wilson, national president of the League.

"At the same time, these achievements are only the essential first steps," Wilson stated. "We call on the Obama Administration to continue to lead in changing the way business is done in our nation's capital," added Wilson.

"2010 is the time to tackle the critical reforms that will clean up the corrupting effects of campaign money throughout our government," she said.

"The administration's government reform agenda this year must focus on the reform and enforcement of the nation's campaign finance laws. The League believes that this means: Repairing the presidential public financing system; Establishing a new public financing system for congressional races; and Fundamental reform of the Federal Election Commission (FEC)," stated Wilson.

"The FEC is failing as an enforcement agency just as the nation is preparing for the 2010 elections. As a start, we urge the President to use his appointment power to put the agency on a better path," she said.

The report card issued by the League, Common Cause, Democracy 21 and U.S. PIRG details seven areas in which the administration has implemented governmental reforms and provides a grade for each area.

- Revolving Door Lobbying Ban, A
- Open Government, A
- Reverse Revolving Door Restrictions A
- Lobbyist Gift Ban, B
- Preventing Lobbyists from Serving on Advisory Boards, B
- Restrictions on Seeking Stimulus Funds, B
- Restrictions on Seeking Financial Bailout, No Grade

## Recall Study Committee Report By: Diana Kingsbury

For the past four months, the LWVAA recall study committee has been hard at work researching recall elections and their impact on voters and the government. Using the recent recall election in Akron as a catalyst, the LWVAA has chosen to study this topic to develop a position on recalls that represents the League principles of what makes democracy work.

Currently, committee members have spent a good deal of time investigating the motivation for the local recall election and its impact on the community and government; the history of recall elections in the United States; as well as the motivation for recent recall elections in the state of Ohio and in the nation. In addition to speaking with local officials and community members about Akron's recall, committee members have spent time reading the local charter language of governments across the country to learn more about why recall elections are called for. In addition to completing this all-encompassing research, the recall study committee has plans to hold a community forum to gather citizen input on what they think are appropriate grounds for recall elections, so that we may critically evaluate what recall elections mean to voters.

The recall study committee has planned its consensus meeting for Thursday, May 20th. At this time, LWVAA members will be asked to gather to discuss and vote on the new League position on recall elections. Further information will be distrib-

uted to you in all upcoming issues of *The Voter* between now and May.

Studies are an important component of the League as an organization and do a great deal to fulfill the League's mission. Studies involve the hard work of the membership and involve the critical evaluation of current government and societal practices and the impact they have on democracy.

I strongly encourage you to be a part of our consensus meeting in May. This will be your opportunity to contribute to the League's legacy and be included in this crucial decision-making process. For more information, please contact me at kingsbury.diana@gmail.com.
